# Guide Description



**AUTHOR NOTE:** This three night, three day stay in Palm Beach Gardens is a perfect golf getaway. Stay at the PGA Resort and Spa and enjoy some challenging golf and beautiful scenery. Visit in the high season (November-March) to get away from those wintry temperatures, but be prepared to pay the premium for a high-season stay. Spring and Summer-time is bargain-time in south Florida, so keep that in mind when planning your trip!

## Day 1 - Palm Beach

**DAY NOTE:** Get ready for a golfer's paradise. PGA National Resort has five championship golf courses designed by top names like Arnold Palmer, Jack Nicklaus and Walter Hagen, and is the host of the Honda Classic every year. The resort has a wonderful spa as well. Go in the off-season between May 26th and Sep 30th for the best rates and golf deals. This trip is based on the "Guys Buddy Trip Golf Package" that the PGA Resort offers. It is a great package and includes 3 rounds of golf, cart, caddy and fees, and 3 night stay for \$999 between April 7-May 25th or \$445 after May 26th. Resort fees are not included. Try to fit in 18 holes the first day if you can, and don't forget to wear your sunscreen! The sun down here is brutal and you don't want to look like a lobster for the whole weekend! For dinner head east on PGA Blvd. to "Downtown at the Gardens" the new outdoor shopping and dining area. There you can find several dining options. If you are in the mood for Mexican food, try Rosa Mexicano. If you want something close by and a bit more upscale, try Zia, in the Embassy Suites Hotel on PGA Blvd. If you want to venture out and see a little bit of the surrounding area, specifically the ritzy and posh Palm Beach Island, you can head to there and really splurge on a first-class meal at Cafe Boulud or Bice (pronounced Bee-chay). After dinner in Palm Beach, head to Cucina dell'Arte a little bar on Royal Poinciana Way for some drinks and people-watching. If you are looking for some night-life in the Palm Beach Gardens area, the "Downtown at the Gardens" area has a great sports bar called the "Yard House" or you can try a wine bar there, called "The Grape". Enjoy!

## Day 2 - Jupiter

**DAY NOTE:** I would suggest starting this day early with an early tee time, so that you can head to the beach and at least get a glimpse of the beautiful coastline southeast Florida has to offer, in the afternoon. Try any of the five beautiful courses, then head to John D. Macarthur Beach State Park. Just take PGA Bvd all the way east until you can't go any further. You will run right into it. The park is 325 acres with 2 miles of beachfront and offers nature-walks, kayaking, and if you go in the evenings in June and July, sea turtle nesting! You may be lucky enough to witness the sea turtles coming onto land to dig their nests on the beach and lay their eggs! After the beach, head back to the hotel to change and freshen up, then it's off to dinner. For the health-conscious diner, try Seasons 52, located on the Intracoastal waterway, with

great water views. I love this place because every entree on their menu is under 475 calories and prepared in a healthy way. They also have an amazing selection of wines by the glass, so I like to sample new wines whenever I go there. If you want something heartier, The Strip House at Downtown at the Gardens is also a great option, or for something casual, Abbey Road Grill and Sports Bar is not far, right off PGA Blvd and Military Trail. If you are visiting during late Feb. or March, you can catch the St. Louis Cardinals in a spring training game at Roger Dean Stadium in Jupiter, FL, just north of Palm Beach Gardens. After dinner, if you want to head somewhere for drinks, the Waterway Cafe in Palm Beach Gardens is a great option, or The Square Grouper in Jupiter is another popular place. Both are on the water and have a very casual atmosphere. Stay hydrated, one more day of golf tomorrow!

## Day 3

**DAY NOTE:** Last full day of golf. Start with a morning treat like a massage or facial at the PGA Resort's fabulous spa. Then have an Italian lunch at Vic and Angelo's located on PGA Blvd just before Military Trail. Play one more round of golf, maybe The Champion if you are really ready for the challenge. By the end of this third day, you will be pretty beat. Take in a movie at the Cobb Theaters in Downtown at the Gardens, or Sunday evening might be a good night for a drive along A1A, checking out the magnificent mansions and estates and enjoying the scenery. If you do decide to take a scenic drive south, head south on I-95 and exit on Okeechobee. Head east and stop for dinner at E.R. Bradley's Saloon, on the Intracoastal Waterway, or you can continue east over the bridge to Palm Beach and turn right on A1A, heading south about 30 minutes to Delray Beach. Once you get there, you can eat at Cafe Luna Rosa or Boston's on the Beach (head to the second floor which overlooks the ocean). Both places offer a great ocean view and a vibrant atmosphere. If you have time to go for drinks somewhere else in Delray, I recommend Bull Bar, Blue Anchor, or DaDa. To get back to Palm Beach Gardens, head west on Atlantic Avenue in Delray Beach to I-95 and take I-95N to the Palm Beach Gardens exit. I hope you had a great trip!

## 2 Café Boulud Palm Beach

**DESCRIPTION:** Snowbird socialites rejoiced over the opening of star chef Daniel Boulud's eponymous restaurant in the Brazilian Court hotel. Nonsocialites said, "Figures, another restaurant where we can't afford even a bread crumb." If you're out to splurge, Boulud is ideal, with an exquisite menu divided into four sections -- La Tradition (French and American classics), La Saison (seasonal dishes), Le Potager (dishes inspired by the vegetable market), and Le Voyage (world cuisine). The roasted barramundi with squash, pomegranate, and brown butter is superb. There's also a light menu offering salads, sandwiches, and even a cheeseburger if you prefer -- try the chick pea fries with piquillo pepper ketchup. If star chefs, stuffy socialites, and froufrou cuisine aren't your thing, don't even bother. © Frommer's

## 1 Henry Morrison Flagler Museum

**DESCRIPTION:** It would be difficult to be in Palm Beach for long without learning about Henry Flagler (1830-1913). The prominent historical figure was the mind behind the construction of the railroad that ran from Jacksonville to the Keys. Opened to the public in 1960, Flagler's 1902 Gilded Age estate, Whitehall, is now the extraordinary Flagler Museum. At Whitehall, which was once described by the New York Herald as "the Taj Mahal of North America," visitors can see the home and many artifacts on display. © wcities.com

### Restaurants Insights

When Henry Flagler and his friends came south to Palm Beach, they brought along their high standards and demands for the best of everything, including fine dining. That legacy can still be found for anyone who takes eating seriously. Palm Beach County has many excellent restaurants to choose from, affordable to very, very expensive, and casual to formal. The range of tastes is considerable, from good old Southern style American to European, Mexican, Asian, and more.

**Palm Beach** For old world atmosphere, noted for its caviar bar and ranking high with the locals, be sure to patronize Cafe L'Europe. Another for continental dining on Worth Avenue is Taboo.

Great Italian fare can be enjoyed at Renato's, and authentic Irish food with lively entertainment and child friendly is Rooney's Public House.

Looking for a more casual atmosphere? Try the Crazy Buffet for a pleasant surprise. It's not like your average buffet restaurant. For terrific hamburgers since 1945, Hamburger Heaven is the place to go. Another popular 1950's American style diner is Rhythm Cafe.

A few other well established restaurants in the downtown district on Worth Avenue is Chuck and Harold's, a 1920's eatery where people watching is unavoidable and entertaining. Noted for fresh seafood entrees is Charley's Crab, and since 1975, another trendy American style restaurant is the Raindancer Steak House.

For the most expensive restaurant in town, but definitely a four-star meal, it's the Florentine Dining Room at The Breakers Hotel.

**West Palm Beach** Here's a community that can boast the same excellent quality dining establishments as it's sister city east of the Intracoastal, offering a variety of ethnic and European restaurants. For Japanese dining that's family friendly, have a go at the Mikasa. If your preference is Mexican tonight with a movie afterward, the Tamayo is right next to the theatre.

Although you'll find this chain in a few other cities, the distinctiveness of the 391st Bomb Group, a WWII themed restaurant with 1940's music, is entertainment in itself in addition to the delicious food it serves.

Another Old World style Italian restaurant in this historic part of Palm Beach is the Stresa. For French Mediterranean fare, the Bellagio offers excellent dining in a romantic atmosphere.

On Saturday mornings, you can enjoy an outdoor street breakfast while buying fresh pastries and vegetables at the GreenMarket in West Palm Beach, a popular weekend pastime.

If you're at the Palm Beach Kennel Club, be sure to dine at the well-regarded Paddock Restaurant.

**Lake Worth** A short drive south into this celebrated community also offers delicious fare such as Audrey's Cookie Boutique and Chesecake Company where you'll find fresh pastries, bakery goodies and a restaurant.

Inside the historic Gulfstream Hotel on the Intracoastal Waterway, try Daniel's Lake Avenue Grille, or if you're on the beach and are ready for breakfast or lunch, the John G's is known for friendly service and good food.

**Southern Towns** In Delray Beach, Ellie's 50's Diner has every dish on its menu named after a 1950s song. Also on the beach, you'll find Boston's on the Beach serves good food all day long.

The Two Georges Waterfront Grille in Boynton Beach has been around for a while. With delightful tropical setting and great food, it's popular with the locals. You won't be disappointed here

Boca Raton, one of the fastest growing communities that offers excellent dining and attractions, not to mention beautiful retirement developments, Carmen's Restaurant and Lounge features great steaks and fresh seafood, all with a great ocean view.

In Lantana, home of the National Observer tabloid on celebrity news, the Ginger Wok offers an intimate atmosphere and delicious Chinese cuisine

**Northern Towns** Communities just north of Palm Beach include Jupiter, made famous

by actor Burt Reynolds, as well as Palm Beach Gardens and Riviera Beach, noted for its marinas, sport fishing charters and dive shops. Wellington is home to the Palm Beach Polo Club. Many excellent restaurants in these towns offer dining establishments that equal those in the county's southern towns.

In Palm Beach Gardens, the Abbey Road Grill and Sports Emporium, featuring TV screens everywhere for sports programs, offers great steaks and seafood.

Palm Beach and its neighboring cities offer a myriad of great places to eat for any time of the day. Depending on what activity you may be pursuing, whether it's a day of shopping on Worth Avenue, playing golf at one of the 147 courses in the county, or dressed to kill for a memorable night on the town, you'll find just the perfect restaurant, café, bistro, or diner to make your day complete. A destination with a warm climate, outstanding cultural and sporting events, great hotels, unique shopping experiences, and excellent dining, it attracts many for both business and pleasure. There's also a variety of entertainment, from sophisticated and complex to bargain basement casual. What more could you ask for?

## Palm Beach Snapshot continued

In Palm Beach County, as in most of Florida, golf is a major sport and there's a course in almost every nook and cranny. At The Breakers- Ocean& West Course(Resort), you'll find some of the oldest courses in the area. Across the Intracoastal Waterway to the west in West Palm Beach, the Okeeheelee Golf Course and the Emerald Dunes Golf Club(Public) will not disappoint the dedicated player looking for a challenge. South of Palm Beach in Lake Worth, the Lucerne Lakes Golf Club(Public) offers some well designed and challenging courses.

For family fun and entertainment, visit the 22-acre Palm Beach Zoo at Dreher Park in West Palm Beach, home to over 500 animals. Right next door is the South Florida Science Museum with prehistoric exhibits, an aquarium and planetarium show.

In Clewiston, a few miles west of Palm Beach, learn about the Seminole Indians at the Ah Tah Thi Ki Museum. Also just west, is the well known Lion Country Safari, located in Loxahatchee.

In North Palm Beach, the Rapids Water Park in Riviera Beach offers a wave pool, slides, and river rides. It's a great place to cool off when the summer heat is on.

There are many parks offering a variety of amenities and activities. In West Palm Beach, the 800 acre Cholee Park features equestrian and mountain bike trails. At the 405 acre Dyer Park, you'll find biking and equestrian trails, picnic areas, freshwater fishing, and sports activities.

For cultural events, there's the magnificent concert hall, Kravis Center in West Palm Beach. Other excellent performing arts theatres include the Royal Palm Performing Arts Theatre and the Royal Poinciana Playhouse.

Every Thursday evening in Centennial Square, free concerts are performed at Clematis by Night which are popular and well attended.

Art shows and festivals in the Palm Beach area are some of the biggest. In March at Lake Worth, just south of PB, the Palm Beach Seafood Festival is a huge event that includes artisans, concerts, and lots of Palm Beach cuisine prepared by local restaurants. A little further south in Boca Raton, a March event is the Meet

Me Downtown where 4,000 artisans and crafters overwhelm US Highway 1. In May, you can't miss the Palm Beach Sunfest.

On a smaller scale, a popular weekly art event for local artists in West Palm Beach is the Art in the City.

Palm Beach is the winter home to several professional sports teams. Avid fans won't want to miss practice sessions and games. In North Palm Beach, you'll find the New York Mets at Thomas J. White Stadium, and the Los Angeles Dodgers at the Holman Stadium. For Saint Louis Cardinals or Montreal Expos training center, check the schedule at Roger Dean Stadium.

For a different kind of spectator sport, take a champagne picnic and watch the ponies at the Palm Beach Polo and Country Club in Wellington, just west of Palm Beach.

Racing and gambling enthusiasts will enjoy greyhound racing at the Palm Beach Kennel Club in West Palm Beach, or junkets from the Port of Palm Beach on the Palm Beach Princess.

Fishing anyone? You've come to the right area, whether it's off a pier or from a charter boat, this sport ranks high here. Marinas up and down the county coast feature many fishing excursion options. Boynton Beach, just south of Palm Beach, offers fishing and diving at the Boynton Inlet/Ocean Inlet Park. In Palm Beach Shores, full and half-day charters are available at the Sailfish Marina.

When it comes to shopping, Palm Beach is in a class all its own. Next to Fifth Avenue in New York, Worth Avenue is most famous. When you get tired patronizing all those expensive specialty shops and you can't carry another bag, rest a while and re-energize with lunch at one of the many bistros and cafes along the shopping district. Don't forget to bargain hunt for designer discards, antiques, furniture and art work at the upscale thrift shop, Embassy Boutique.

Just north in Palm Beach Gardens, the The Gardens Mall offers 160 specialty shops, or south in Boca Raton, there's Town Center at Boca Raton with 220 shops.

When it comes to entertainment, you'll find it all and then some here in Palm Beach and close by. There's so much to do and

see. But you'll just have to discover it for yourself!

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# Jupiter Snapshot

## Local Info

Jupiter and the surrounding beach communities are first-class destinations for fun in the sun, but they also boast a host of non-beach-related attractions sure to float your boat.

### Jupiter

Make no bones about it, the first thing you'll want to do in Jupiter is hit the beach. Miles and miles of sand stretch all along the coast, but good places to start include Jupiter Beach Park, at the mouth of the Loxahatchee River. To experience the distinctive beauty of this mighty waterway, hop on a boat or spend an afternoon on the Riverwalk, an expertly landscaped pathway that snakes along the water, past marinas, yacht clubs, parks and dockside restaurants and watering holes like Jetty's and the world-famous Square Grouper.

Right across the river from the Grouper is the Jupiter Inlet Lighthouse, a towering reminder of the town's maritime heritage, celebrated by locals and tourists alike. Tour the lighthouse and picnic in the lush riverfront park in which it sits. For more on the history of this seaside community, attractions like The Last Galleon, a sunken ship, and the Dubois Pioneer Home, built atop an authentic Native American shellmound, are must-see spots.

Today, Jupiter is home to some of the most cherished big-league points of interest in all of South Florida. The Busch Wildlife Sanctuary, a combination veterinary hospital and educational facility, is beloved by kids of all ages from all over the world. Similarly huge crowds gather at Roger Dean Stadium, spring training home of the Florida Marlins and the St. Louis Cardinals. Join them and watch the "boys of summer" work themselves out of their wintertime funks. If there is one treasure in Jupiter to which every visitor must make a pilgrimage, surely that treasure is the Burt Reynolds & Friends Museum, a comprehensive commemoration of the life and times of the mustachioed icon – and the iconic mustache itself. If the lines

and admission fees of zoos, spectator sports and museums prove too daunting, put yourself in the center of your very own first-hand adventure. Take the plunge with Jupiter Dive Charters or Scuba Works. They'll gear you up for and ferry you out to one of the Jupiter coastline's many wreck diving sites. If you like hooking fish rather than just gawking at them, set out to sea as a contestant in the Jupiter Billfish Tournament, a three-day sportfishing extravaganza. And for an activity completely devoid of fish, enter yourself in Jupiter's annual Loggerhead Triathlon. After all that, hunger will surely strike. When it does, choose from high-energy beachfront eateries like Dune Dog, or off-beat local favorites like Little Moir's Food Shack.

### Juno Beach

As if Jupiter proper were not beach oriented enough, this district takes it to the max. Juno Beach Park is the anchor, with its miles of sandy beaches, trails, picnic areas and more. Before hitting the beach, you'll need to hit a surf shop such as Ground Swell, where you'll be outfitted with everything you need for a proper endless-summer experience. The Marinelife Center of Juno Beach will push to enjoy the beach in a whole new way. Through educational programs and displays, and face-to-face encounters with live leatherback sea turtles, the center leaves no visitor unappreciative of nature's bounty.

Restaurants here, even if not located right on the beach, honor South Florida's seafood-lovin' heritage with all their might. Hurricane Cafe, for example, has a boatload of elegantly prepared fish plates on their menu. At the annual Art Fest by the Sea, the food is a big part of the show. The fest draws hordes of fun-loving art lovers to Juno Beach, all reveling in an epic celebration of art, food and fun.

### Tequesta

This district is home to a fine mix of culture and commerce. The Lighthouse Center for the Arts champions art, drama and creativity of every stripe, offering programs and exhibitions both enlightening and

entertaining. The height of culture! Just down the road is Tequesta's Fashion Mall, a stunning example of a mall being the best a mall can be. The height of commerce! Combining the best of both worlds is independent bookseller My Book Place—track down a fine piece of literary culture, and then buy it!

When it comes time to get back to nature, Tequesta's got a bit of that too. Coral Cove Park is a spacious beach, wide open and unspoiled. Bring the whole family and marvel at the rays of the sun and the churning of the surf. Loggerhead Reef, just off shore, is an ideal place to dive and soak in the undersea wildlife.

### Palm Beach Gardens & Palm Beach County

Golf is the name of the game in Palm Beach Gardens. The world-famous PGA National Resort is located here, and fans of the sport know this is the place to be for a truly all-golf-all-the-time experience. Book a room at the on-site PGA National Resort Hotel & Cottages, and play a few rounds. The resort also plays host to such internationally renowned events as The Honda Classic Tournament.

If your party includes members less inclined to label themselves "golf crazy," send them over to the Eisey Campus Theater for an evening (or afternoon) of dance, drama or musical performance. The Raymond F. Kravis Center for Performing Arts down in West Palm Beach is a prime performance destination if there ever was one, playing host to operas, plays and more. If their distaste for theater is on par with their distaste for golf, perhaps they like to shop! In that case, Gardens Mall just might be the answer.

## History

### Early History

The early history of Jupiter is shrouded in myths and conflicting historical information. Scholars have surmised that before gaining its present day name, the area was home

to a Spanish fort called St. Lucia, in 1565. However, the Jupiter Inlet had also long been home to a Native American tribe, the Jegas. Conflict between settling soldiers and the native population ended with the abandonment of St. Lucia.

In 1697, the folklore of the Jupiter Inlet was added to by the publication of the memoirs of a traveling Quaker, Jonathan Dickinson. After a shipwreck on his way back from Jamaica, Dickinson and his companions were captured by natives, whom he called in his book's title "inhumane Canibals." His party was held for several days at the location of the modern-day Dubois Pioneer Home. Afterwards, they were allowed to escape northward on a 230-mile trek, during which five people died. Wisely enough, nobody took it upon themselves to move into the area until the 1800's.

### The Origin of Jupiter

Later, early British settlers in the process of making maps for the area mis-recorded the name of a small Native American tribe living at the mouth of the Loxahatchee River as 'Jove' instead of 'Hobe'. Jove being the proper name for Jupiter, or 'Father Jove,' head of the Roman Pantheon, others explorers continued the string of associations, and Jupiter became the one of only areas in the fledgling United States to be named after a Roman god.

After the Revolutionary War, Jupiter began to develop a reputation as a center for the ship pilots who guided vessels up and down the coast. The Jupiter Inlet Lighthouse was completed in 1860, giving the area a new importance, and the town of Jupiter began to grow.

Life in Jupiter in these early days relied the ocean and rivers. Income came from passing boats, while food came from fishing. There was even a school boat that took children to their studies. Over time agrarian pursuits evolved, including the farming of flowers and citrus fruit, and inland logging began.

### Birth of the Modern Area

It was only in 1925 that the town of Jupiter was officially formed by a group of locals. Since then the town, although consistently less famous than the celebrity-rich city to the south, Palm Beach, has experienced a slow but steady growth, as the warm climate and friendly residents made it a tourist destination.

The two closest neighboring towns, Juno Beach and Tequesta, are often grouped together with Jupiter by the local government. Both were founded in the 1950's, Juno Beach from a former stop on the Celestial Railway and Tequesta taking shape out of what a local bridge tender had described as "a jungle."

The entire area remains much less densely developed than the lower parts of Palm Beach County. However, between its early history, its tourist reputation, a new branch of the Scripps Research Institute, and Burt Reynolds, Jupiter does have a few claims to fame. Come visit and help contribute to the growth of what is, without a doubt, one of Florida's finest small towns.

### Hotel Insights

Affluent as the area is, Jupiter and its surrounding towns still offer some very affordable accommodation. For those who want a taste of luxury, however, the area has a few truly high-class resorts and hotels. For everyone in between, there is a good range of places to stay that will neither break the bank nor disappoint budding hedonists. Whichever category you fit into, be warned that at many places prices skyrocket from mid-December to mid-April, as vacationers flock to the warm Florida climate.

### Jupiter

For travelers on a budget, the Baron's Landing Motel & Apartments is a throwback to the good old days of vacationing before big resorts. Just like the Pa-Ja Motel & Suites, it features a private dock for boating and fishing. The La Quinta Inn Jupiter offers another budget choice, while the Fairfield Inn & Suites edges upward somewhat in

price. Another step up can be taken at the Comfort Inn & Suites, while those seeking a resort atmosphere and true extravagance will want to check out the Jupiter Beach Resort & Spa.

### Juno Beach & Tequesta

Juno Beach and Tequesta are both small, but accordingly quaint and friendly. Your options here might include local motels and B&Bs, or chains like the Holiday Inn Express and Hampton Inn in Juno Beach. The Jupiter Waterfront Inn in Tequesta is plush, privately-owned, has its own boat dock, and can be rather cheaper than comparable places in Jupiter.

### Palm Beach Gardens

Approaching Palm Beach from Jupiter, you will find this tiny town. It occasionally bulges to overflowing when PGA events occur at the PGA National Resort, which offers a hotel and cottages of its own. The Palm Beach Gardens Marriott is a luxurious option for both business travelers and tourists, while the Doubletree Hotel Palm Beach Gardens isn't as nice, but is also much cheaper.

Beyond Palm Beach Gardens you'll find Palm Beach and its surrounding neighborhoods. There's no shortage of accommodation in the area. For a couple of the better options, try the Ritz-Carlton or Marriott Ocean Pointe Resort.

For a side of kitsch with your meal, check out Little Moir's Food Shack, an unpretentious hole-in-the-wall serving up one of the most interesting menus in town. Those who enjoy dining with a view will love Jetty's, a dock-side restaurant serving delicious gourmet dishes with a panoramic view of Jupiter Inlet Lighthouse.

### ...And the Turf

Nothing says Southern cooking like an old-fashioned BBQ, and Jupiter is in no way lacking in the down-home cuisine department. There's no fooling around with food at Uncle Mick's Bar & Grill, where locals and visitors alike crowd in to stuff their guts with pub-style fare. Local treats and spicy appetizers rule at Blondie's Bar & Grill, while Jupiter's original R.J. Gator's Florida Sea Grill & Bar continues to serve up some of the best drinks around. If you long for a taste of something out of the ordinary, try your luck with local specialties like the Dolphin Sandwich at the popular Dune Dog Cafe.

### Alternative Tastes

For those who seek something more than steaks, grills and seafood, there are several other options that may tickle your taste buds. Too Bizaare Cafe & Wine Bar is a funky hang-out with menu items such as salads, wraps, and a wide selection of wine, all served alongside live entertainment. If you are in the mood for some jazz with your meal, the Blue Note Cafe is the place to be. For those longing for Mother England, Queen Mary British Pub can provide you with hearty fare and draughts aplenty. When the craving for pizza or pasta strikes, locally-owned Italian eatery Nick's Tomato Pie or Tequesta's Baldino's are on-hand to serve large portions of traditional favorites. All hope is not lost for vegetarians in this seafood-loving town, as you can indulge in the Corner Café's special Portobello Mushroom Sandwich and garden variety greens and salads.

### Rise and Shine

In search of some breakfast to start your day? Nothing beats the bagels at Einstein Brothers, which also serves pastries and coffee for those in a rush. Oven-fresh is the status quo at Mr. Bread, and when in the Juno area, stop by Hurricane Cafe, which serves some of the region's best breakfast (as well as light lunch and dinner). ©

## Nightlife Insights

Jupiter is, above all, a seaside community, so many of the town's activities take place under the sun. However, that does not mean that the culture is lacking, as the people of Jupiter are glad to point out. Here you can find jazz clubs, performing arts centers, pubs, and of course, many a tribute to Burt Reynolds.

### Fun Day Out

What better way to enjoy your time in sunny Florida than out in the open air? Loggerhead Reef is one of the most stunning of the area's many reefs, as it is the home of the endangered Loggerhead turtles. Take the plunge with one of the many dive companies in Jupiter, and swim with the animals. If you prefer to stay on dry land, there are several parks and open air spaces great for family outings. Ocean Cay Park is a wide expanse of beachside fun, complete with volleyball courts and picnic areas. The Riverwalk is a pleasant trail that wanders along the water and is a popular spot for morning joggers and romantic evening strolls alike. Burt Reynolds Park has 35 acres of open terrain, including a variety of trails and BBQ pits that are a favorite for community parties. The Busch Wildlife Sanctuary is a combination wildlife hospital and education center that offers a series of programs designed to educate and enthrall its audiences. If you're lucky, you can check out the Jupiter Jubilee which takes place every February. It is a Florida-style extravaganza, complete with food, music, drinks, and dancing, and is not to be missed.

### Music & Nightlife

Hit the small clubs and music joints for some great live entertainment, and wash it all down with a specialty cocktail or hearty draught. Blue Note Cafe is a haven for jazz musicians, and patrons can hear the blues as they munch on some of the house specialties. Rooney's Pub is Jupiter's quintessential Irish Pub, complete with loud music, rowdy regulars, and World Cup Soccer on the big screen. For all the glitz and glamour of Miami, head to Jax 126 a popular nightclub with a great atmosphere and plenty of room for dancing. If you don't much feel like shaking your groove-thing to the music, stay at the beach and hang out at the famous Square Grouper, a tiki-style getaway that serves you drinks in the sand. Talk about total relaxation!

### Theater

For a sample of some sophistication in between trips to the sand and surf, Jupiter has several theaters staging musical performances, ballets, and lectures. The Lighthouse Center for the Arts and Raymond F. Kravis Center for Performing Arts focus on visual and theater arts, and hold a series of workshops for budding dramatists. Eissey Campus Theater is a great place to find lectures and discussions on a variety of current topics, while Maltz Jupiter Theater features big-name performers and bands.

### Art and Museums

For the connoisseur in you, indulge in the fine delights of Jupiter's art and museum scene. In March you can visit the Art Fest by the Sea, a multi-faceted exhibition of art and food that is a crowd-pleaser for locals and visitors alike. To unleash the artist within, stop by Go Van Gogh to design and paint your own masterpieces. The Dubois Pioneer Home is an educational look at an authentic 19th century home, furnished to look just as it did when it was built in 1898. It is also located on top of a Native American shell mound, and includes information on the history of local tribes as well as on pioneer life. But what trip would be complete without a stop at the Burt Reynolds & Friends Museum? If you're lucky, you might see the man himself come

in for a surprise visit. After all, he only lives a few miles away!

### Things to Do Insights

#### Wildlife Weekend

Animal lovers have a lot to keep them interested in Jupiter. From organizations that specialize in bringing nature to the masses, to a host of stunning locales where the masses can experience nature for themselves, this South Florida enclave has something for just about everyone. First on your list must be Busch Wildlife Sanctuary, an animal hospital that also works wonders as an entertaining and educational destination. Like a zoo, but more hands on, and like a museum, but more real, Busch will satisfy every zoological curiosity. A few miles down the coast in Juno Beach is The Juno Beach Marine Life Center, a similarly hands-on sea turtle sanctuary. Just a short ways north, Blowing Rocks Nature Preserve is a Nature Conservancy-sponsored stretch of land where you can venture onto untouched beach dunes, coastal strands, mangrove wetlands, tropical and oak hammock, as well as a rocky limestone shoreline. While you're here, marvel at the migrating birds and abundance of flora and fauna.

If you've got the chutzpah to take to the seas and plunge down into the murky depths, opportunities to get even closer to the untamed wild come a dime a dozen. Enlist the help of a company like Jupiter Dive Charters, and then head out! At Loggerhead Reef, you can actually swim alongside wild sea turtles. If you make it to Captain Kurle's Reef during the months of January and February, you just might get to watch some sharks mate. Watch the teeth! If you haven't the temperament for shark hanky-panky, perhaps the Goliath Grouper is more your speed—large and in charge, but not especially predatory. Find him and lots of his buddies in a spacious undersea cave known as Hole in the Wall.

#### River Voyage

This tour is like the boat ride in *Apocalypse Now*, but with tiki bars instead of violence and existential dread. The intent here is to cruise up and down the rivers and canals, taking in the sights and sounds, and tying up at the occasional marina to see what's happenin'. First, one must choose one's method of travel. Canoe Outfitters of Florida can set you up with everything you need for a proper canoe excursion. If you set out from Jupiter Hills Lighthouse Marina in Tequesta, you can rent your choice of a pontoon, ski or deck boat. If you'd prefer a guided tour, board the *Manatee Queen* for a specialized journey around the waterway.

Once you push off, cruise past landmarks like the Jupiter Inlet Lighthouse, a bright-red icon that harkens back to the days of yore. At some point, you might want to tie up and stretch your legs on Jupiter's Riverwalk, a leisurely riverside walkway that stretches on for miles. When you thirst needs a- quenchin', set sail for the Square Grouper, a tiki bar made famous by the Jimmy Buffet-Alan Jackson duet "It's Five O'Clock Somewhere." The margaritas are cold, the live music is groovy, and the dress code ranges from sand-caked beachwear to evening casual. For a full-on fine dining experience, dock at Jetty's and sit down to some of the river's finest seafood and steak.

#### Burt Reynolds Bender

Without a doubt, Burt Reynolds is an American institution, and Jupiter is proud to call him its favorite son. He is a Hollywood legend, star of such award-winning cinematic classics as *Smokey & the Bandit*, *Citizen Ruth* and *Boogie Nights*. He is an honorary Sheriff's Deputy in 11 cities and counties, as well as the states of Arizona, Hawaii and South Carolina. Burt Reynolds is a film icon, Burt Reynolds is a mustached hero to children young and old, and Burt Reynolds is the law. The following tour will afford travelers the opportunity to pay just a modicum of the homage due this untouchably talented gentleman.

Stop by Burt Reynolds Park in central Jupiter for a picnic in the shade of the trees dedicated to the man in question.

Bask in the glory of a landscape only nature could create, and of which only Mr. Reynolds' name is worthy. Next, cross the river and head for the lighthouse, home to the headquarters and museum of the Loxahatchee River Historical Society. There, you'll find a Deliverance-evoking look at the effects the *Mighty Loxahatch*' has had on the region. Finally, race Cannonball Run-style down Highway 1 to the Burt Reynolds & Friends Museum, a Burt-sanctioned repository of movie memorabilia, sports collectables and items awarded to the man himself (such as keys to cities and honorary Sheriff's Deputy badges). Now you have done your duty as a faithful fan.

#### Golf Getaway

Florida is famous for its golf, and the Jupiter area is no exception. No visit to this fair city would be complete without a survey of the links. Begin at the Golf Club of Jupiter, open to the public and centrally located in Jupiter proper. After nine or eighteen, move on to the newer, Joe Lee-designed Abacoa Golf Club, also in Jupiter and also public.

When you tire of the pedestrian quality of the public courses, cruise on down to Palm Beach Gardens and enter the Mecca-like realm known as the PGA National Resort. Home to its own hotel and cottages, as well as events such as the Honda Classic, this sprawling paradise will have you playing, living, eating, and breathing nothing but golf for the entirety of your stay.
